# Biography

## John F. Miller, Jr.



John F. Miller, Jr. is the deputy general manager of the Aerospace Testing Alliance (ATA), a joint venture between Jacobs Sverdrup (JS), Computer Sciences Corporation (CSC) and General Physics (GP) at the U. S. Air Force's Arnold Engineering Development Center (AEDC), Arnold Air Force Base, Tenn.

AEDC is the largest complex of test facilities in the U.S. The center operates 58 flight simulation test facilities worth more than \$7.6 billion that can test aircraft, jet engines, missiles and spacecraft under simulated environmental flight conditions including speeds as fast as Mach 20 and altitudes up to 300 miles. Virtually every high performance aircraft, missile and space launch system in use by the Department of Defense today has been tested in AEDC facilities, as well as all manned NASA systems and many civilian aircraft.

Miller is a CSC vice president and previously served as the general manager of the former mission support contractor for AEDC, Aerospace Center Support (ACS), a joint venture formed by Computer Sciences Corporation (CSC), DynCorp and General Physics. He was responsible for the operations, maintenance and repair of ground environmental testing and base support facilities. Miller joined ACS as deputy general manager in 2001. He joined CSC in October 2000 as an operations director.

A retired U.S. Air Force Major General, Miller held a variety of key positions in a military career that spanned nearly 32 years, including five assignments overseas. His last military assignment was as Chief of Staff, U.S. Atlantic Command, Norfolk, Virginia from 1998 to 1999.

Miller entered the Air Force in 1968 as a distinguished graduate of the Reserve Officer Training Corps program and completed undergraduate pilot training at Laughlin Air Force Base, Texas. He twice won international "Top Gun" awards, was an operational test and evaluation pilot, commanded the first operational squadron of the F-117A stealth fighter and commanded operational flying wings on three different occasions. He was selected as Air Combat Command's outstanding wing commander for 1994. He also served two duty tours in the Pentagon and was the Chief of Staff for NATO Headquarters Allied Forces North Europe from 1996 to 1998.

Miller was a command pilot with more than 3,600 fighter-flying hours, including 126 combat missions flying the F-105 Thunderchief, with 86 missions over North Vietnam. He was a distinguished graduate of the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College and a graduate of the National War College. He earned a bachelor of arts degree from Clemson University, South Carolina, and a master's degree from the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.
